Student Handout - Syllable Types

| Examples | Syllable Type and Description |
| :---: | :---: |
| cat <br> chop <br> trip <br> jump <br> crush | Closed Syllable <br> This type of syllable has only one vowel, and ends with at least one consonant. <br> Short vowel sound |
| I <br> he <br> try <br> so apron | Open Syllable <br> This type of syllable ends with a single vowel, or IS a single vowel. <br> Long vowel sound |
| home ape like smoke | V-C-E Syllable <br> This type of syllable has a vowel, followed by a consonant, followed by "e". <br> The first vowel is long, and the final e is silent. |
| table thimble shuttle little dribble | L-E Syllable <br> This type of syllable has a consonant followed by "le", and occurs at the end of a word. <br> The e is silent so only the consonant and " l " are heard. |
| first car nurse worth worker | R-controlled Syllable <br> This type of syllable has a vowel combined with the letter "r". <br> The vowel is neither short nor long and is either like "er" "or" or "ar". |
| street <br> moon <br> boat <br> bean <br> head <br> great | Double-Vowel Syllable <br> This type of syllable has two vowels side-by-side. <br> The vowel combination may have one of several different sounds (as in the last three examples). |
